Off The Beaten Path - In Search of Catesby's Lilies

It all started on a beautiful Sunday morning, September 22. Our last hike of the Off the Beaten Path Series had been fully booked for weeks, the weather was just as auspicious, and the Preserve parking lot was filling up with people and anticipation. Each time I've led this hike, I've promised the attendees a close encounter with one of the Preserve's most iconic wildflowers - Catesby's lily

(*Lilium catesbaei*), and we've never failed to find at least one, but each new hike I worry a bit about whether this time might be the first to fail. As it turned out, this was the best of them all. We found 13 lilies in full bloom!

The fall Off the Beaten Path hike is really a wildflower walk. Fall is the best time in Florida to see wildflowers so it is always guaranteed to be a beautiful walk. The Catesby's lilies are just an added bonus to the overall experience. In a way, they are the giant pandas of the plant world - the photogenic species that everyone wants to see above the rest. Catesby's lilies are found statewide, but they are extremely habitat sensitive and only found in places

that meet their strict habitat needs. Their persnickety needs have made them a state threatened species and a wonderful indicator of habitat quality. At one time, the staff at Brooker Creek Preserve was monitoring over 500 marked lilies. That study was terminated over a decade ago and areas that once supported hundreds are now nearly devoid of them. Finding blooming plants now is



even more of a thrill than it was in the past.

The walk (it is hardly a

hike the way we do it) began promptly at 9 am. We left the main parking lot, wound our way along the public trails





,Catesby's lily, carphephorus, and blazing star

and then broke away from them on trails not open to the public. Thanks to Duke Energy, we also crossed over their property with permission and eventually scoured the xeric uplands along the Hillsborough County line for additional wildflowers. The Florida paintbrush (*Carphephorus corymbosus*) and the blazing stars (*Liatris* spp.) were just beginning to bloom here while the honeycombhead (*Balduina angustifolia*) was nearing its peak. With the wildflowers in bloom, we also saw lots of butterflies, bees, and other pollinators. The Off the Beaten Path hikes have become very popular with our members and the general public. The funds raised from the registrations are also an important source of revenue in our efforts to support the Preserve and its programs. We get to go to some of the best parts of the Preserve in doing so - places not open to the public and places you can't see otherwise. As we plan the dates for next year, watch the newsletter so you can mark your calendars and consider joining us for the series or for just the walks/hikes that interest



interest you the most.

News from the Wildflower Garden By: Pam Brown

The Wildflower Garden put on a spectacular show in September and October. The blazing stars, blue curls, black-eyed susans, and others were in full bloom. By the time of the Owl-O-Ween Festival on October 26th the narrow-leaved sunflowers and Gulf muhly grass were in their full glory as well. I want to thank everyone who volunteered this year and helped make the Wildflower Garden great. With your help and the abundant rain during the summer, the garden has been especially lovely. You are all the best!

Our next workday in the Wildflower Garden will be on January 25, 2020 (no workday in November or December due to proximity to holidays). We will be partnering with the "Return the

Preserve" work group to do some heavy renovation of the garden for our January 25th workday. Watch for a notice for the hours for this day. If you can help in the garden, please bring your hat, gloves, tools and wear closed toed shoes and join us for some gardening fun. We will provide breakfast snacks. We would love to see you there!

Pam's Gardening Tip

We have finally cooled down a bit and the plants in our landscapes are slowing down and going dormant for the winter. In Florida, dormancy is not as easy to spot. Some trees and plants do lose their leaves, but our evergreen plants go into dormancy as well. This means that they do not require as much irrigation. You can turn automatic irrigation back to only every two weeks at the most. You should not need to prune and definitely do not need to add any fertilizer. Dormant plants are not really growing so they do not need the added fertilizer. Any fertilizer added to the soil will be wasted or washed into the street gutters. Grass will only need to be mowed every two to three weeks. The only exception to this is annual flowers that are planted for color. They will need to be spoon fed a small amount of fertilizer each month during their bloom season. I have most of my annuals in large containers so that watering and fertilizing is easier.

Take a break from gardening chores and enjoy the cooler weather!

September's discussion was about E. O. Wilson's 'Anthill' (2010), a story of a young man's coming of age in the Deep South. The book was generally liked by our crowd of readers. The ending seemed to come suddenly and in an unexpected way. (Spoiler alert: In



thinking about what to write, I realized the ending reminded me of an unexpected incident in the movie 'Contact'.) Dr. Wilson spoke at Eckerd College a number of years ago. When asked after his talk what the single most important thing one could do for the environment was, he answered: "Get rid of your lawns." This was alluded to in 'Anthill'. Liz and I went to Chicago to see him speak at the Newberry Library (guess what snow looks like in the air!). The book he was pushing was sold out but I had taken my copy of his book 'Consilience'. He signed it and drew a little ant over his signature.

The Friends group wondered how autobiographical the book was. Parts seemed very personal. I reread most of my copy of his autobiography, "Naturalist' (1994), looking for clues and finding few. Wilson did mention he got help from Archie Carr, "...the great expert on Caribbean natural history..." Ah, the perfect segue.

In October we discussed any book by or about Archie Carr (1909-87). We had a special guest, Barb Hoffman, who worked with Archie. Barb's talk was awesome!

I read "A Naturalist in Florida" (Yale Univ., 1994) A Celebration of Eden, ed. by Marjorie Carr, foreword by E. O. Wilson. Let me hazard a paragraph from the book:

"No significant preserving of nature can be done with slight sacrifice. The true test will come when great sacrifices are needed, when it becomes necessary to fight the indifference of most of the world and the active opposition of much of it, to surmount man's ingrained determination to put the far future out of his mind in matters of current profit." p 233.

It is accepted policy not to discuss political topics in the activity and doings of the Friends. I cannot help but say that Brooker Creek Preserve's very being is as political as it gets.

Next time, we discuss Journeys Through Paradise' by Gail Fishman. There is plenty of room at the table. We meet the first Saturday of the month at 9:30am at the conference room in the Ed Center (main building).
